Their church testimonies are full of gratitude towards God for giving them food, clothes, an education, house parents that love them and for the groups that come down to bless them and spoil them!! Building a High School



Our high school building is making progress thanks to our spring work crews. Thank you "Menlo Park" group (a group actually made up from various churches represented from the San Francisco Bay area and Seattle) for your vigor in not only building the trusses but also nailing down the plywood and our follow up group from Bend, OR, Grace First Lutheran Church who helped lift up the remaining middle trusses with great teamwork. (They also were busy with many other ongoing projects around the ranch.) The goal is to have the two classrooms finished by the middle of August for our coming school year. This past year the first-year high schoolers were able to squeeze into the junior high schedule sharing classrooms. The coming school year there will be two



high school groups which complicates rotations with the one building. One or two high school classrooms will be needed; thus, our mighty warrior summer groups will accomplish that task – we have no doubt about that!

Cynthia goes to school



Three months ago, our school's specialist team was meeting with a family who has a special education student in our Trade school program. As we were talking to them about our objectives, learning and social goals for their son, somehow, we began to talk about other family members

in their home. They shared that they had an 11-year-old daughter, Cynthia, who had never been to school. She was born with cerebral palsy and is developmentally delayed. She is not completely toilet trained and depends 100% on mom to take care of her needs. We talked to the parents on how our staff might be able to help improve her education, fine and gross motor skills, and how our school and staff might be able to support both Cynthia and her family. A week after our meeting, Cynthia started attending our school once a week. Her mother stays with her so that she can learn what our occupational therapists, Denise and Sam, our speech therapist, Cariño, and our special education teachers can teach them. The first few weeks were really tough. Cynthia's communication skills were limited to pulling people's hair, screaming for attention and throwing whatever was at her reach. Gradually, she is learning how to communicate through Spanish sign language and some verbal monosyllables; she has reduced pulling our staff's hair or throwing fits to communicate. With the help of our therapists she is starting to leave her wheelchair and wanting to venture out by walking around our classrooms. With these improvements we hope to add more days to her school schedule. To see Cynthia smiling and learning new things has really been an encouragement for her parents and her older brother.

If I had to say I learned one thing from my time at Rancho Santa Marta, it's patience. For sure without a doubt I never could have completed my time here without God-given patience. One of my weekly tasks was to help the substitute house parent watch the kids. There are almost always ten kids and almost always a dispute. We start at 6:30 am to get them ready for school and end at 8:00 pm when they go to bed. When I first started I was quick to discipline and didn't give it much thought but as time went on God showed me his wisdom in how to choose my battles.

During my time in occupational therapy in Denise's classroom I worked with a child with learning & speech challenges. We did the same thing every day for 9-10 months; throw the ball, write your name, tie your shoe. All the while he was mumbling words I couldn't understand. I was discouraged. Why should I spend my time with him if he won't change? But God said, "Just wait." Ok Lord, show me those plans that you have for me. (Jer. 29:11) I'll wait. Then a month ago, it was like he woke up, he started saying words we could understand; numbers, help, and you're welcome. He excelled at throwing the ball and started hitting his target. He could do most of the steps to tie his shoe. Thank you God, Your plans are way better, than mine.

I am sad to see this year ending. I have learned so many lessons from so many teachers. Thank you to the staff of Rancho Santa Marta and Colegio Santa Marta for having patience with me as I stumbled through learning the Spanish language and social customs. Thank you to Denise for showing me what it looks like to be a good therapist. Thank you to my roommate Grant for having my back in any and all situations. Thank you to Rod and Tina and their family for their wisdom and hospitality. Thank you to my parents Cary and Krista for an endless stream of love and Skype calls. Thank you to my home church Trinity Oregon City for supporting spiritually and financially.
