Preschool!

Our 4-year old's preschool classroom has opened. One of the outcomes of Tina's doctorate program in Special Education was to open a pre-school program at our Colegio Santa Marta. She believes it's important to have special needs three-and four-year-old's to be in a minimal day classroom setting with regular education students. This gives these young learners an understanding of what school entails. It also enables the teachers and professional staff to pinpoint the specific problems they have and begin to work with these children before they enter the kindergarten classroom. It's a win-win situation for both student/family and school/staff as plans are developed and implemented.





The focus on reaching out to the special need students at an early age is a great idea but one that is presenting its challenges. Our preschool classroom has twelve students and out of those twelve children, five of them are diagnosed with a specific special need. Autism has been an increasing concern in schools as more children are being classified under the huge umbrella of the autism spectrum. Colegio Santa Marta is experiencing this increase mostly in our primary grades. Tina has become an advanced certified autism specialist that has encouraged and enabled her to design a program specifically targeting children with autism. She has converted the occupational therapy room into an autism laboratory where she is able to work one on one and/or small groups with these students. This is a very challenging task because even though each child is diagnosed as a child with autism, they display a wide variety of symptoms, and each one is so unique from the other. We believe this program will continue to grow and we will need more personnel who are trained or who are willing to be trained to be able to come alongside the child with autism and allow him/her to be successful in the classroom situation.

Welcome Gabriel

Gabriel is our new arrival to the family. He is an 8-year-old boy born with fetal alcohol syndrome. His mother was on drugs and did not want him, so he was given to a single mother who heard that baby Gabriel needed a home. At four years of age, this surrogate mother, who never adopted him, came to Santa Marta looking for a place where Gabriel could be "fixed" for a year or two. She was expecting to take him back once Gabriel was disciplined, toilet trained and accustomed to school. We politely said no to the request, and we had not heard from this lady until a year and a half ago. She contacted us again asking for help with Gabriel. We told her the only way we would take him if she went through the government social system and request that he reside at Santa Marta. She took the steps and now we have Gabriel as one of our members. He's a very polite young boy and is looking forward to going to school. He will stay with Sergio and Wendy and their family along with Esteban. We are excited for Gabriel and can see how the Lord's hand has been on his young life. Welcome Gabriel!!
